



All of this money must be raised through donations. Lobbyists and special interest groups donate a large portion of this money with the hope that if their

candidate is elected, they will have their senator's or representative's ear when they are promoting their cause. Some special interest groups will even contribute to both major party candidates for the same office so that no matter who wins the election, the group will have an "in" with the winner.



time in history, candidates for the Connecticut General Assembly can receive funding from the Citizen's Election Program if they agree not to accept any funds from lobbyists, contractors and political action committees of various organizations. More than 130 candidates have already qualified for funds from the new program by raising funds through small contributions from individuals who live in their district. The candidates may also accept small contributions from individuals outside their district, but those contributions will not count towards the minimum needed to qualify for funds from the Citizen's Election Program. Funding for the program comes from the sale of abandoned property by the State, voluntary contributions and interest earned on money already in the program. None of the money comes from taxes or fees. There are 151 seats in the House and 36 seats in the Senate. That is a total of 187 seats in the Connecticut General Assembly. If both major parties had a candidate for every seat, there would be 374 candidates for the General Assembly. Why haven't more candidates qualified for funds from the new program? In some districts there is only one major party candidate who is running unopposed. Many of these candidates have chosen not to apply for the funds so there will be more for the candidates in the contested races. Other candidates have not raised enough funds within their district to qualify for the Citizen's Election Program funds. Still other candidates have chosen to take a "wait and see" attitude towards the funds and are relying on contributions which make them ineligible for the funds in this year's election.

Speaking on the new program, Governor M. Jodi Rell said, "What do the people of Connecticut get in return? They get election campaigns free from the influence of special interests. They get election campaigns without lingering questions about who donated and why. They get candidates who can spend less time fundraising and more time with voters. And they get elections where ordinary citizens who never thought they could afford to run for office can now mount a credible campaign." The Grange has a long and cherished history of staying strictly non-partisan at all times. We lobby for issues, but we never endorse a candidate for office or contribute to their campaigns. Due in large part to our non-partisan principles, we are able to work successfully with legislators on both sides of the aisle. Grange members are encouraged to work as individuals for the candidates of their choice, but the Grange itself does not work for any candidate. The Grange did not take a position for or against the Citizen's Election Program when it was being debated in the General Assembly because the delegate body at the State Grange sessions had never even considered a resolution on this issue and the Legislative Committee felt it was too close to partisan politics for comfort. But we would like to think that the General Assembly looked at the Grange as an organization that lobbies for issues while staying out of partisan politics and drafted the Citizen's Election Program based on our principles.


We had 8 entries in the Needlework contest this year, 2 entries in the Musical Craft contest & 2 entries in the new scrapbook contest.



Governor expands agriculture programs

A new state law ensures high school students better access to 19 programs that teach aquaculture, animal and plant science, agricultural mechanics, agribusiness, food science, biotechnology and environment.

The new law changed the name of the Vocational Agriculture program to Agricultural Science and Technology Education, which one educator said would address the erroneous perception that the program was only about cows.

Although the state requires school districts that do not offer vocational agriculture training to allow their students to attend programs at other schools, the new law ensures the sending won't districts reduce the number students they send.

"The name change is something we worked for for a long time," said Robert Gambino of New Milford, who was a plant science teacher at Housatonic Valley Regional High School in Falls Village for 33 years.

"I would go to the home of an eighth-grade student and tell the mother her son was interested in plant science, but when she heard it was a vo-ag program, she said no,' Gambino said.

But when teachers started emphasizing the program's science and technology, he said there was less resistance.

Gov. Jodi M. Rell signed House Bill 5869, An Act Concerning Agricultural Science and Technology Education, in a ceremony Saturday Trumbull at Agriscience School.

The vo-ag program is one of seven state-subsidized career and technical education programs. Others are business and finance technology, medical careers, and family and consumer sciences. They are among the choice programs the state offers public school students.

"Basically, they are statesubsidized regional facilities that provide a specialized curriculum in agriscience," Thomas Murphy, state education department spokesman, said Tuesday. "They are embedded in allpurpose high schools and the state subsidizes the tuition the sending school district

must pay for their student."

About 3,000 students in the state now participate in the programs.

"The State Department of Education believes that having options for students is important," said Greg Kane, who oversees the program. "A lot of students can benefit from these programs."

Kane said the new law requires the sending school districts to maintain the number of students they send to the program, if interest exists. said because schools are struggling financially, some have cut back on the number of students they send.

The program, prepares students for entrylevel employment or higher incorporates education, technologies, rigorous

academics, current labor market information and decision-making career skills, Students must also take part in a supervised work experience related to their career interest.

Gambino said program, started in the early part of the last century, has new relevance in today's

"I think as we look into the future, this country is going to move towards more self-reliance, he said. "This is a quintessential education program. It's community based, it's hands on, and it lets the student stay in a school setting to learn things like calculus and take part in sports.

"It's a model that has been tried and emulated throughout the country."



Broke All the Records

Edith Schoell, State Historian

In a copy of the National Grange Monthly for May 1924, in the Connecticut Grange News, theheadline "Broke All Records" caught my eye. "Big meeting of Quinebaug Pomona at Abington."

"Quinebaug Pomonatried an innovation in its meeting in Abington, April 26th with Wolf Den Grange, when dinner was served from 5 to 7 P.M., the 5th Degree followed and ten a Lecture Hour program. The result was the largest degree class in its history (80 candidates) and one of the greatest crowds the Pomona has ever brought together. The Wolf Den Grange hall would not house half of them and it was necessary to adjourn to a big carnival

hall in the village, fortunately available, where the enthusiastic crowd of fully 300 fifth degree members enjoyed a program of more than two hours duration."

"Enjoyable entertainment features were given, including whistling solos by L.G. Tolles of Southington, Steward of the State Grange. Charles M. Gardner, of Springfield was speaker on the topic "Interpreting the Grange"... Many Patrons drove long distances by machine, but Mr. & Mrs. Tolles and Mr. & Mrs. Marsh headed the list, the former being 70 miles from home and the latter over 60 miles. It was a great occasion."

Last month I and a few other state officers met with the National Grange Membership/Leadership Director, Rusty Hunt. Naturally the topic was about membership. We talked about who the members of the Grange might be. There was talk of how people don't have interest or don't have time; that the schedule of their lives doesn't allow for membership in the Grange.

I am often traveling around the state of Connecticut. This meeting with Rusty was in Coventry. Noel Miller told me that their Grange was meeting in the oldest Grange building in the state of Connecticut. On the way to Coventry from my home in Chester I traveled the 'back roads' as the route was many miles shorter than taking the highway. There are two things that I notice in my travels. One is that I see many of what used to be small farms are now housing developments. Fields that my Dad would have loved to have used for crops now have five hundred

thousand dollar houses in them. The other thing that I notice is the former Grange buildings that are still called Grange buildings but they don't have a Grange meeting in them. These things give me a tremendous sense of loss.

Depending on who in what Grange you may talk to, the Granges in Connecticut are just able to maintain their status quo. When Rusty talked about membership, he mentioned a pamphlet that he had about the four steps of recruitment of new members. They were as follows. Step 1: Set the Stage. As an Ambassador of the Grange you should identify yourself with the Grange by having some type of Grange memento on or about your person. Step 2: Listen. Learn what is important to the person and where there is a fit communicate how the Grange has similar interests. Step 3: Fill the Need. Communicate that the Grange can be the potential members answer to what they like doing. Step 4: Ask Them to Join. This is the most important step. Ask them directly, "Please join our Grange". Try to have a membership form with you when you go out and meet people so that you may sign them up. There are many people who would love to get involved with their community if they could and someone would just ask. To me the most interesting

thing that Rusty talked about was a new subordinate Grange that had formed in New Hampshire. At some point in time I can imagine that each Grange in the State of Connecticut was a new Grange. He said that when it came right down to it a new Grange was easier to start than it was to keep some of the older Granges going. All that it took in this case was a group of friends looking to have a format to gatherings that they held. The Grange was the perfect answer as it is a wide spread organization with what many people see as ideal endeavors. I think that we as Grangers should take this as a personal challenge. When Rusty said all it took was a group of friends, I felt as if someone just had the nerve to say that a basic reason why my Grange might be failing was because I simply don't have or don't know how to make friends. I don't know the feelings of other Grangers, but mine is a feeling of defiance. If our forefathers could have enough friends not only to form a Grange, but also in many communities to have the where-with-all to even have possession of their own building, then I would like to think that we as Grangers should have the ability to maintain our own. I would even like to think that the Grange is so GREAT that we could even influence people to start NEW Granges. Have you ever thought about it? I think it would be great to have all our Grange members feeling the way that I do and then doing something about it.

important force in the universe that brings it to its proper end.


