

New Scholarships

At the 2016 Annual Session, Delegates approved a resolution directing the State Scholarship Committee in cooperation with the State Executive Committee to review the Student Loan and Scholarship program.

The most significant change to the program is the addition of two new scholarships for students entering their first semester at an accredited college or university. Two \$500 scholarships will be available to students who meet the same criteria as the existing scholarships with the exception of the need for a high school (or equivalent) transcript.

In recent years, the Committee has awarded up to five \$2,000 scholarships. This amount will now become the minimum award with the dollar amount of the scholarship determined based on the number of awards and the amount of interest income available to the Committee.

On the Student Loan side, it has been decided to open up the amount available to borrow. Loan amounts will be determined on a case by case basis using criteria and credit information outlined by the Committee and the State Grange Executive Committee.

This is a great opportunity for college-bound high school seniors. Any assistance available to them will make their likelihood for success in college that much greater with the addition of the new \$500 scholarships.

With the ever-increasing cost of higher education, the availability of additional funds from Student Loans will also make it possible for students to reach their educational goals.

In the past, a co-signer was the only major requirement for a Student Loan. Credit checks have been added to the application process to ensure the security of the funds entrusted to the State Grange for this program over the years.





I have mentioned in previous issues the problems with the Celebration Banquet at State Session. After careful consideration by the Executive Committee and discussion with the Holiday Inn, we have decided on a couple of changes to the schedule.

First, the Celebration Banquet will now be held on Friday

evening (Oct. 20) beginning at 7:00 P.M. The Sixth Degree will move to Saturday afternoon following the close of the afternoon business session. It is our hope that these changes will encourage more people to attend the banquet and will make it easier for members wishing to receive the Sixth Degree to get to Norwich on a Saturday afternoon.

An additional problem with the banquet has been the difficulty in getting members to reserve tickets in advance. So, beginning this year, there will be a cut-off of October 1 for advance purchase of Banquet tickets. After Oct. 1 the price will increase to \$40 per person.

Past State Master Frank H. Peet



Frank H. Peet was born on November 30, 1892 in Kent, Connecticut. He was the son of Frank S. Peet and Annie (Hall) Peet. He received his education in the local grammar schools, High School and Connecticut Agricultural College.

On September 25, 1915, he married Clara Boyd Tuttle. She was the daughter of Doctor Albert L. Tuttle and Lana W. Sloat Tuttle.

To them were born the following children: Phillips and Horace Peet.

He was a Republican in his politics and a member of the Kent Congregational Church. He held the following Town offices: Selectman; a Member of the Board of Relief (now known as the Board of Tax Review); Constable;

the General Assembly in 1939 and served as Senator of his District for two separate terms; was Commissioner of Agriculture during 1945, and 1946 and as Deputy Commissioner of Farms and Markets during 1947 to 1953 and is now Deputy Commissioner of Agriculture at this writing; Past President of Patrons Mutual Fire Insurance Company Glastonbury, Connecticut. While in the Senate of the State of Connecticut he served

as President Pro Tempore.
He was a member of St.
Luke's Lodge No. 48 of
the Masonic Order and a
Member of the Eastern
Star.
He held many Grange

offices, some of which are as follows: Master of Kent Grange; Master of Housatonic Valley Pomona; Deputy of Housatonic Valley Pomona 1916-1921; General Deputy of the State Grange 1922-1925: Steward of the State Grange 1926-1929; Overseer of the State Grange 1930-1933; and the 15th Master of the present State Grange 1934-1937 and a member of the Executive Committee of the State Grange during 1938-1945. Sister Peet has held various offices and has always been his

Represented his town in helpful assistant.




Brother Peet was a Director of the National Grange Fire Insurance Company of Keene, NH.



The application was pretty easy and with sufficient advance notice we are happy to help other Granges apply next spring. The grant does not give the Grange any direct money, but it would make donations eligible for either a 100% or a 60% tax credit. Grant requests can be up to \$150,000. The Simsbury Grange submitted one grant for \$14,000 (energy conservation projects) and one for \$22,000 (upgrades related to job training).

May 11: Agriculture committee reported that the fields are ready but the weather is not. As I write this report I have the heat going in the house to chase chill and dampness issupposed to go into the forties tonight. The committee reported further that in Binghamton, NY there was heavy wet snow that may have caused some crop damage. Geremia Farms was looking for season help. The weather wasn't looking to promising for the day before Mother's day with heavy showers in the middle of the day; for that reason I decided to call off our Flower sale. Janet reported that she

received back some ads for the fair book. Jim had brought in 2 cases of fair booklets from the ACF.

A very interesting

Gardening Program was

then presented by Vern Grant. Vern is your typical home gardener and he has had a garden for quite a few years. He starts his plants indoors early. He makes a miniature greenhouse with seed trays. To get started he mixes water with starter soil to get it moist and then puts the soil in the seed trays. To these trays he adds 8 to 10 tomato seeds to each compartment. Then he bags the tray and places the tray on heating pad that keeps the tray at a temperature of 72 to 76 degrees. The bag helps keep the soil moist. There GRANGE is no need for light yet because the seedlings don't need it yet. After 5 to 7 days the seedlings appear and he will place them under a standard double bulb 4ft fluorescent light fixture for 17 to 18 hours a day. When they get about a few inches tall he will take 4 to 2 seedlings from each compartment and plant them in a 4" inch pot. When they are about 4 to 6 weeks old he will transfer these pots out to his garage to harden them up. When they have been out there for a week or so then they are ready to go outside once the weather is warm enough. Vern also explain how he saves seeds: he just doubles up a paper towel and just puts the seeds in-between. So nothing real complicated. He also likes to use and make his own organic fertilizer. He uses pin wheels along the garden and pie tins on fishing line to chase birds away.







This Brownie Flag from Spicy Southern Kitchen makes a fun, patriotic dessert. Covered with white frosting, fresh blueberries, and sliced strawberries.

Brownie Flag

INGREDIENTS:

12 tablespoons butter

1 1/2 cups sugar

2/3 cup unsweetened cocoa powder 3 eggs

 $1\ 1/2$ teaspoons vanilla extract

3/4 cup flour

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon baking powder

1 cup mini chocolate chips

1 cup fresh blueberries

2 cups sliced strawberries

2 (16-ounce) containers white frosting

DIRECTIONS:

Preheat oven to 350 degrees and line a 9X13-inch pan with aluminum foil. Make sure the foil extends up the sides so that you will be able to lift the brownies out of the pan. Spray with cooking spray.


Melt butter in a medium saucepan. Whisk in sugar and coca powder. Make sure mixture is not hot and then whisk in eggs and vanilla extract. Stir in flour, salt, and baking powder. Fold in chocolate chips. Pour batter into prepared pan. Bake for about 22 to 25 minutes. Let cool completely.

Lift brownie out of pan and place on a serving tray. Spread with a thin layer of frosting. Arrange blueberries in rows in top left corner. Place strawberry slices in 5 rows. Place remaining frosting in a large pastry bag fitted with a large star tip. Pipe frosting between rows of strawberries.


Refrigerate until ready to serve.

Although this question was originally, rather flippantly, posed by Cain, after having slain Abel, as an attempt to feign innocence, it is answered fully in many places in scripture. Yes, I am my brother's keeper, in that I am told to watch out for the

welfare of all other people with whom I have any sort of relationship. This can be divided into two parts: firstly we should avoid any sort of violence towards others, including not only physical violence but also heated argument and verbal abuse, slander, gossip, and arrogance; secondly we should act with brotherly love towards all, keeping them safe to the best of our ability, and helping them to find adequate food, shelter, and love.

Perhaps St. Paul says it best in his first letter to the Corinthians, chapters 12-13, which includes this description of brotherly

Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It does not dishonor others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres.

And again, in the first letter to the Thessalonians, Paul writes:

"And we urge you, brethren, to recognize those who labor among you, and are over you in the Lord and admonish you, and to esteem them very highly in love for their work's sake. Be at peace among yourselves. Now we exhort you, brethren, warn those

who are unruly, comfort the fainthearted, uphold the weak, be patient with all. See that no one renders evil for evil to anyone, but always pursue what is good both for yourselves and for

And in Psalm 82 we read:

Give justice to the weak and the fatherless; maintain the right of the afflicted and the destitute. Rescue the weak and the needy; deliver them from the hand of the wicked."

And finally, as members of Patrons of Husbandry, we are told that part of the chief objective of the Grange is "to develop a mutual respect and concern through Brotherhood.
